LEGISLATION

- **1. Unsafe Used Tires.** AB 949 prohibits an automotive repair dealer from installing a used unsafe tire as specified. Status: Signed by Governor.
- 2. Independent Contractors vs Employees. AB 5. This bill provides the factors of the "ABC" test, as specified, to be applied to determine the status of workers as employee or independent contractor. The bill also provides a business to business exemption (e.g. automotive repair shops conducting sublet repairs with third party vendors), as long as the vendor meets the criteria specified in the bill. Status: Signed by Governor.
- **3. Battery Fees.** AB 142. Current law requires both consumers and manufacturers to pay a \$1.00 for each new battery sold until April 2022, at which point the consumer fee would increase to \$2.00 and the manufacturer fee would be eliminated. This bill would instead require the manufacturer fee to increase to \$2.00 starting April 2022, for a total of \$4.00 battery fee. Status: Signed by Governor.
- **4. Electronic Receipts-Paper Waste.** AB 161. Concerns. Requires a business to provide a proof of purchase to consumer only at the consumer option.

Also prohibits proof of purchase from containing bisphenol A or bisphenol S. The bill exempts Invoices. Status: held in Committee. Two year bill.

- **5.** Private Post Secondary Education. AB 1343 & AB 1345. Oppose unless amended. These bills are part of bill package targeting bad actors in the Private Post Secondary Education. These bills need to be amended to address concerns; otherwise they will negatively impact good performing schools including Universal Technical Institute (UTI). Status: Both bills held in Committee. Two year bills.
- **6. Minimum Franchise Tax.** SB 349. This bill would have reduced the minimum franchise tax, as provided, based on the gross receipts of a corporation. The bill was sponsored by the California Small Business Association. Status: Vetoed.
- 7. California Consumer Privacy Act (CCPA) Bills. AB 25, AB 874, AB 1146, AB 1355 and AB 1564. These bills made changes to clarify and to ease CCPA compliance for California businesses. Status: All bills signed by Governor. The Attorney General is also proposing regulations to further clarify the CCPA.
- 8. Vehicle Exhaust Noise. AB 112. Allows an individual who is cited for exhaust noise standard violation to fix the noise violation and provide proof of correction. Status. Held in Committee. Two year bill.
- **9. Tire Tax.** Oppose. AB 755 would have established a new tax of \$1.50 per tire, on top of the current \$1.75 tax

already charged for a total of \$3.25. The additional revenue would go to stormwater projects that remediate zinc pollutants. Status: Died on Assembly Floor. Two year bill.

10. Sales Tax on Labor. Oppose. SB 522 intends to make major tax reforms including expanding the sales tax to all services, including automotive repair labor. We believe that this bill will most likely move next year. Status: Senate Rules Committee. Two year bill.

UPCOMING LEGISLATIVE & REGULATORY PROPOSALS

Below are legislative/regulatory proposals being considered in Sacramento for next year.

Auto Repair Industry and Rating System. There continues to be talks of legislation that would create a grading system for all auto repair shops similar to restaurants which would help consumers distinguish between good shops from bad. Assembly member Low (Chair of the Business and Profession Committee) wants to provide consumers with more transparency and will be introducing legislation next year. We will work with the assembly member for possible alternative solutions, including legislation that would expedite the disciplinary process without jeopardizing

any repair shop due process rights. See Auto Body News Article.

California Vehicle Safety Inspection program. There has been discussions of introducing legislation to establish a vehicle safety inspection program in California. In 2017, Assembly member Chau carried AB 475 which would have required salvage vehicles to pass a safety inspection before the vehicle could be re-registered with the DMV. AB 475 was eventually dropped due to concerns raised by the auto auction yards and insurers. We will continue working and monitoring whether a safety inspection bill will be introduced next session.

Transmission Fluids. The California Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA), along with assistance from BAR is in the process of developing new regulations for lubricants including specifications, transmission fluids advertising and labeling requirements. CDFA concerns involve Current automotive repair dealer's adding additives to base fluid (Multivehicle Transmission Fluids) to meet OEM performance requirements. CDFA has indicated that these additives may not be compliant with California laws. An upcoming workshop to discuss was continued and will be scheduled in the near future.

Auto Body Regulations. BAR is proposing regulations to update collision repair equipment requirements and standards for repairs to supplemental restraint systems. BAR held two workshops. Based on feedback BAR made significant changes to the proposed regulations. See link below for revised proposed text. BAR removed references to OEM and Non-OEM definitions (which were controversial) and provided additional clarity on the equipment requirements. Overall it appears the revised proposal addressed many concerns that were raised in workshops. For more information contact: Mark Guess at <u>Mark.Guess@dca.ca.gov</u>

SCCA's Lobbyist Jack Molodanof and Dave Kusa participated in the BAR Advisory Comittee Workshop held in Sacramento on Thursday October 17, 2019. Below is Jack's brief summary.

BAR Advisory Committee Meeting

- 1. **DCA News.** The Governor has appointed Kimberly Kirchmeyer as the new DCA Director. Kirchmeyer was previously the Executive Director for the California Medical Board.
- 2. Legislation and Regulations. Legislation: Bills that passed and take effect next year. AB 142 (Lead Acid Batteries); AB 596 (Service Bulletins & Consumer Authorizations); AB 949 (Unsafe Used Tires); AB 1538 (Auto Collision Coverage); SB 210 (Heavy-Duty Smog Check Program). Two years bills pending: AB 161 (Electronic Receipts); AB 210 (Smog Exemption); AB 390 (Violations for muffler noise); AB 755 (Tire Tax); AB 1359 (Towing); SB 59 (Automated Vehicle Technology); SB 460 (Biennial Registration). Regulations: Rehabilitation Criteria for licensure; STAR Program clean up; Laws/Regulations training; Smog Check Repair Assistance; Licensing applications; Smog Check Training Providers; Brake Lamp Stations and Adjusters Updates. - 3. California Vehicle Inspection (Cal-VIS) System Project. The new state contract for ongoing smog check maintenance and operation was awarded to Encore Consulting LLC. The transition to Encore to take place on November 1. Smog Stations will need to enroll with Encore in order to continue in the smog check program. For more information contact: Clayton.leek@dca.ca.gov
- 4. **Operating and Enhancing the Cal-VIS.** The Cal-Vista system is a complex tiered system involving network connectivity, internal BAR applications and interfaces with multiple business partners. Much time and resources is spent simply

maintaining and making sure the smog check system is operational. There are approximately 162 open change requests. Any change to the system needs to be vetted carefully to make sure it is worth the time and money. The BAR is looking at making some future changes but needs to prioritize. Some changes being considered include: enhanced DAD security, improvements and bug fixes, adding safety recall Data to VIR, display vehicle specific emission warranty messages, updating BAR-OIS supporting new DAD equipment, biometric scan in lieu of BAR-OIS password. - 5. Advanced Driver Assistance Systems (ADAS). Jake Redenroth from asTech provided an excellent presentation on ADAS. The presentation surrounded the ever changing calibration evolution and high margin of error. Examples of dealers not understanding the the calibration requirements, misusing targets to calibrate vehicles, problems with mil thickness of paint on bumper covers and issues surrounding modifying vehicles and installing aftermarket parts (i.e. windshields, lift-kits, etc) were discussed. It's clear that the future is here and upon us and that auto repairers and other stakeholders need to be aware and work together to make sure vehicles are properly and safely calibrated.
- 6. Permanent Diagnostic Trouble Codes (PDTC) update. PDTC requirements were implemented on July 1, 2019. The standard is that vehicles must have 15 warm-ups cycles and 200 miles to allow codes to reset. The data shows that on 2010 and newer model year inspections, approximately 100 PDTC failures per day which is an increase failure rate by one third on these vehicles. - 7. On Board Diagnostic (OBD) Systems Tampering Prevention. BAR is proposing requiring that Calibration Verification Number (CVN) (number set by OEM to verify integrity of vehicle software) and

Calibration Identification (Cal-ID) (ID for the software installed on the Electronic Control Unit) be retrieved during smog check inspections. Smog check inspections will not be completed without retrieving this information. If information doesn't match OEM or system has been tampered it will be directed to Referee. The target date for implementation is July 2020. For more information contact: Greg Coburn at <u>Greg.coburn@dca.ca.gov</u>.

8. Enforcement Statistics Update. Consumer Complaints to BAR are a follows: Engine Repair/Performance 35%; General Repair Maintenance 18%; Auto Body 15%; Transmission 8%; Smog 6%; Used Car Transactions 4%; Vehicle Warranty 3%; Unlicensed Activity 4%. Auto Body Regulatory Workshop

BAR is proposing regulations to update collision repair equipment requirements and standards for repairs to supplemental restraint systems. BAR held a workshop on April 18, 2019. Based on that workshop BAR made significant changes to the proposed regulations. See link below for revised proposed text. BAR removed references to OEM and Non-OEM definitions (which were controversial) and provided additional clarity on the equipment requirements. Suggestions at the meeting included making sure that equipment requirements applied to the types of repairs being performed as well as types of vehicles being repaired and that trade standards apply to automtive painting. SCCA Vice President Rory Balmer opened the meeting by welcoming those in attendance and leading them in the flag salute. He then introduced first time Team Weekend Attendees, Corporate Partners, and thanked them for coming and getting involved in ASCCA through committee meetings, Team Weekends, and chapter events.

Following the opening remarks, the Government Affairs committee met to discuss relevant legislation that ASCCA has been monitoring. Don Seyfer gave updates on NASTF's activities announcing the hiring of Holly Wolf to manage the organization. NASTF is currently focusing on scan tool training and was been connecting directly with automakers about the service training around data security.

D. Kusa reported that shops should consider applying for their VSP (Verified Security Professional) noting that this will help avoid delays in their abilities to work on cars, as well as gave updates on the bills that we have been monitoring. Dave also reported that the Governor signed of AB 949, the unsafe used tire bill that will prohibit automotive repair dealers from installing an unsafe used tire on a motor vehicle for use on a highway. The bill requires an automotive repair dealer to use a visual inspection to determine whether a tire meets the criteria of an unsafe used tire. Next, the Public Relations Committee, chaired by Jerry Kubitsky, discussed their effort to encourage members to participate in charitable activities in order to build trust and credibility around ASCCA shops through their new Members Care Program. They are seeking members who volunteer their time for worthy causes to tell us their stories.

The Membership Committee announced that they will be raising the referral aware fee to \$125 from \$75, as well as adding resources on our website for members to get new signups. Gene Lea from Kukui has agreed to join the committee as a new member. Membership hopes that raising the fee will help encourage members to reach out to other shops and sign up new members.

The Revenue and Benefits Committee, led by Vice Chair Rob Pitari, reviewed their year-to-date income and reported that they are almost \$30,000 above their 2019 revenue goal. Way to go! The committee discussed the need for additional members and talked with a couple potential members at Team Weekend. A few Team Weekends ago, AutoZone and ASCCA agreed to share an ad that would be placed in Ratchet & Wrench. This ad was approved by the committee and will be in upcoming issues soon.

The ETI Committee, chaired by Grant Takikawa, was joined by school instructors from Fresno and Orange County. They explored ways to promote a career in automotive technology and will be working with the Women in Automotive Committee to produce videos that would highlight students, teachers and seasoned professionals' testimonials about the rewards of a career in automotive technology. They are also working to build a comprehensive list of high schools and colleges with automotive career technical education. Additionally, they reviewed the video library currently available on the ASCCA website and discussed ways to raise awareness of the educational resources available on the website.



During the lunch break, Chair of the Nominating Committee, Rocky Khamenian presented a plaque in recognition of our newest Hall of Fame Nominee, Bob Klingenberg for his long-time service and dedication to ASCCA. Several years back, Bob stepped in during his term as ASCCA President to run the organization's operations during a difficult time. He then found and hired AMG and kept everything running smoothly. We are who we are today in large part because of his hard work and dedication. Thank you, Bob!

Afterward, Team Weekend attendees enjoyed an educational session about the future of the Automotive Industry led by Bob Cushing, President and CEO of WORLDPAC. Afterward, Jenna Simon, one of Broadly's business consultants, presented techniques and tips for shops to get 5-star ratings on Google, Facebook and important social apps.

Later in the afternoon, John Gustafson, owner of Gustafson Brothers Automotive and Team Weekend host presented a session about the current state of the auto industry and the importance of involving young techs. That evening, Kevin Fitzpatrick and his team presented a demonstration of ADAS. Attendees gained some excellent insights and information and came away with concrete ideas to apply to their business.

Afterward, John Gustafson was honored as ASCCA's 2018 Member of the Year and presented with a plaque for his service.
